

Ohio General X-Ray Machine Operator License (GXMO)

Your tuition for the Medical Assisting with X-Ray Tech (Limited Scope) program includes the cost for the first attempt for your Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) exam.⁽¹⁾ Remington College also pays for your first attempt at the General X-Ray Machine Operator License (GXMO), and the related application fee.⁽¹⁾ Passing the GXMO exam and obtaining licensure are required in order to practice as a General X-Ray Machine Operator in Ohio and once you graduate, you can take the GXMO exam.⁽¹⁾

The General X-Ray Machine Operator license (GXMO) is offered through the Ohio Department of Health. In the State of Ohio, any individual who performs radiologic procedures on humans must hold a valid Ohio radiologic license.

- Applicants must first complete an accredited GXMO didactic educational program. Remington College's Medical Assisting with X-Ray Tech (Limited Scope) diploma program satisfies this requirement.
- Remington College will supply applicants with a GXMO exam registration packet.
 Completed registration forms and exam fees must be submitted to RadEd by the registration deadline that correlates with your exam date.
- Upon completing the exam, RadEd will send an official exam score certificate.
- Applicants must then complete an accredited GXMO clinical education program. Remington College's Medical Assisting with X-Ray Tech (Limited Scope) diploma program satisfies this requirement.
- GXMO license applications are available on the Ohio Department of Health Radiologic Licensure website. Your complete application must contain the following:
 - Application and fee
 - Didactic course certificate
 - Clinical course certificate
 - Examination certificate

All of these certifications are accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), which was created by the Institute for Credentialing Excellence (ICE):

- Phlebotomy Technician Certification (CPT), offered by the National Healthcareer Association
- Registered Phlebotomy Technician (RPT), offered by American Medical Technologists
- Phlebotomy Technician (NCPT), offered by the National Center for Competency Testing
- EKG Technician Certification (CET), offered by the National Heathcareer Association
- ECG Technician (NCET), offered by the National Center for Competency Testing
