### 2024 REMINGTON COLLEGE CRIME & SECURITY REPORT

#### Introduction

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act), codified at 20 U.S.C. § 1092(f) as a part of the Higher Education Act of 1965, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. All public and private post-secondary educational institutions participating in federal student aid programs are subject to the Clery Act and compliance with the provisions of the Clery Act and applicable regulations does not constitute a violation of Section 444 of the General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g), commonly known as the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA).

The Clery Act requires colleges and universities to publish an annual report every year by October 1<sup>st</sup> that contains three (3) years' worth of crime statistics and certain security policy statements, including sexual assault policies, which assure basic victims' rights, the law enforcement authority of campus security, where the students should go to report crimes, and domestic and sexual violence prevention and awareness education.

### Reporting Crime and Other Emergencies on Campus

Remington College is committed to providing an environment that provides security for persons and property without the need for unduly burdensome policies and practices. No absolute guarantee of individual safety or security of property is possible, but with the cooperation of students, faculty, staff, and visitors, it is possible to provide a level of security that is reasonable, effective, and relatively unobtrusive. All members of the Remington College community are expected to familiarize themselves with Campus security policies and procedures, adhere to these policies and procedures, and immediately report violations.

If you witness any non-emergency criminal incidents or safety concerns and/or are the victim of criminal behavior on property owned or controlled by Remington College, promptly report it to the local police jurisdiction office. In the case of an emergency, calls should be made to 911. Immediately after reporting the incident to the local police jurisdiction office, please report the incident to the Campus President, or any other school official. For victims who are unable to make a report to local law enforcement, the Campus President will accurately and promptly notify local law enforcement of a crime when the Campus President is made aware of the crime and the victim's inability to report the crime. Victims or witnesses of a crime or incident who wish to report that crime or incident for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics on a voluntary,

confidential basis may do so by contacting the Campus President and informing him/her of the crime or incident. At the time of publication of this report, Remington College has no pastoral and/or professional counselors working with the students and/or employees.

## Campus and Community Notification of Criminal Activity (Timely Warnings)

Remington College places a high priority on the safety and security of all members of the Campus community. It is the policy of Remington College to notify members of the Campus community of any reported crime(s) that are determined to pose a threat to the safety of students or employees. Anyone with information warranting a potential timely warning should report the circumstances to the local law enforcement, by phone oncampus at 911 or off-campus at 911. The Campus President is responsible for determining the need for and implementing timely campus notifications. If the Campus President deems it necessary to notify the Campus community of a threat, the notification will be posted in accordance with the Emergency Preparedness Plan. The notifications will allow members of the Campus community to know what concerns currently exist so they can better protect themselves.

#### **Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures**

Remington College places a high priority on the safety and security of all members of the Campus community and will make efforts to immediately notify, either via verbal announcement, electronic notification, or Public Safety Bulletin, and facilitate the evacuation of members of the Campus community in compliance with the Campus Emergency Preparedness Plan (unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency). The Campus President will attempt to confirm the existence of a significant emergency or dangerous situation by contacting local law enforcement. After confirming the existence of a significant emergency or dangerous situation, the Campus President will determine the appropriate segment or segments of the Campus community who will receive notification, determine the content of the notification, and will initiate the notification system. The Campus President and his/her designees are responsible for implementing the actions required by the Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures in accordance with the Campus Emergency Preparedness Plan.

At least once per year, Remington College will test its emergency response and evacuation procedures. In conjunction with this test, Remington College will post or otherwise publicize a copy of its Emergency Preparedness Plan to the Campus community.

### Access to and Maintenance and Security of Campus Facilities

Remington College is a private institution, and as such reserves the right to limit the use of its grounds and facilities as it deems appropriate. Access to any Remington College facility by any person or persons is strictly limited to those having legitimate business in that area or facility. Most Campus buildings and facilities are accessible to students, parents, employees, contractors, guests, and invitees during normal hours of business, Monday-Friday. Access times will vary depending upon the nature of the building and its activity. Except for those students, faculty, and staff with keys or appropriately authorized access cards, access is generally restricted to Campus-affiliated personnel during recognized holidays. Outside of normal business hours, in some locations, alarms are also provided to sound if doors are opened or compromised. Many buildings' highrisk areas are equipped with intrusion alarms and/or duress alarm systems for the protection of staff. Remington College does not maintain any campus residences.

Motor vehicle parking lots, pedestrian walkways, and building exteriors are well lighted and the Campus's design criteria calls for a high level of illumination on all new buildings and surroundings. Members of the Campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies to the Campus President or other member of Campus Management. Exterior doors on Campus buildings are locked each evening by the Campus President or his/her designee. Door and security hardware operating deficiencies should also be reported to the Campus President. Parking lots and areas may be actively patrolled by a private security firm or employed security guards. Ask your Campus President for more information.

Remington College does not have campus law enforcement and, for campuses that have them, security guards are not authorized to make arrests. If security guards witness or are informed of a crime being committed they will notify local law enforcement who will be responsible for the investigation of the alleged criminal offense(s).

#### **Security Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs**

All students are required to attend the Campus' Orientation at which time they are cautioned to avoid loss of property and/or injury to self or others by reading and observing the safety and Campus security information that is posted in the designated campus locations, which includes but is not limited to, the student lounge, disseminated at Orientation, as well as is available on the school's website.

In addition to the Annual Campus Security Report, which is posted in the student lounge area and to the school's website, Remington College makes literature available that is provided by community and government agencies which describes various programs and help numbers for personal safety, health, and emergency counseling. Information is contained in the appendices at the end of this report. Literature is displayed in the designated areas of the school.

A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention programs is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others.

### **Criminal Activity by Students at Off-Campus Locations**

Remington College does not have any recognized off-campus facilities. All criminal activity observed by students at off-campus locations should be immediately reported to local law enforcement.

#### **Drug and Alcohol Policy**

Remington College is committed to having a Campus that is free of illegal or abusive use of drugs and alcohol. In keeping with this commitment, it is the policy of Remington College that the possession, sale, use, or distribution of illicit drugs, alcohol, or other intoxicants in Campus buildings and facilities and at official Campus functions held on Campus is prohibited. Any violation of state or federal drug, alcohol, or underage drinking laws or the violation of the Campus's policies regarding alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs by students, staff, or faculty shall be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination and/or expulsion. It is unlawful to sell, furnish or provide alcohol to a person under the age of 21. The possession of alcohol by anyone less than 21 years of age in a public place or a place open to the public is illegal.

Excessive use of alcohol and other drugs is a serious health problem in itself, but alcohol and drug abuse can also contribute to a host of other physical and mental health problems such as unwanted pregnancy, violent behavior, HIV infection and other sexually transmitted diseases, and psychological depression.

Remington College encourages students and employees who are experiencing substance abuse problems to seek assistance from resources available to them on Campus, as well as from agencies and self-help groups available in the community. A list of these resources is available from the Campus President. Please see either the Campus President or student Remington College Drug and Alcohol Abuse policy for more detailed information.

### Sex Offender Registry and Access to Related Information

In accordance with the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006, the "Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act" of 2000, which amends the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, the Jeanne Clery Act, and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, Remington College is providing a link to State Sex Offender Registries in *Appendix 1*. The "Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act" requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the Campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State

concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student.

#### **Sexual Harassment Policy**

Consistent with Remington College's Non-Discrimination Notice and the U.S. Department of Education's implementing regulations for Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 ("Title IX") (see 34 C.F.R. § 106 et seq.), the College prohibits Sexual Harassment that occurs within its education programs or activities. As such, the College has implemented a Sexual Harassment Policy and Hearing Procedures to address allegations of Sexual Harassment. ### Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Policy

It is the policy of Remington College to prohibit domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking and to prevent sex offenses committed against students, employees, visitors to the Campus, and other persons who use the Campus facilities. Sexual assault is not only a criminal act of violence, aggression, or coercion against a single individual, but is also an attack on human dignity, a value essential to our Campus community. For these reasons, Remington College encourages individuals who believe they have been a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking to report these incidents to appropriate Campus and governmental authorities as outlined in the Sexual Harassment policy. Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking are all a form of sexual harassment. Sexual harassment is prohibited by the Campus's policy and is a form of sex discrimination prohibited by Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and by Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

## Programs to Prevent Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking

Several programs and resources are available to members of the Campus community on the topics of sexual harassment, rape, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Remington College hosts prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees as well as an ongoing prevention and awareness campaign for all current students and employees. For the initial prevention and awareness program, incoming students will receive information and have a short discussion about prevention and awareness of sexual harassment, rape, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, and sexual assault, and stalking and will be provided a Clery Act Education Program Handout at Student Orientation and

new employees will be provided with the same information, handout, and opportunity for short discussion at New Employee Orientation. Due to the way Remington College offers its education programs, the Campus has a Student Orientation every month. For the ongoing prevention and awareness campaign, Remington College will provide notice, via email, via the student portal, and/or by posting notices on the bulletin boards throughout Campus, to all current students notifying them that they may attend the portion of the Student Orientation containing the domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking prevention program and will also conduct annual prevention and awareness training for all current employees to ensure that all students and employees receive ongoing prevention and awareness education. Further, Remington College will provide a website link to students where they can re-watch Remington College's Campus Sexual Violence Elimination Act (Save Act) training video that is played during the Student Orientation and employees can access the Save Act video via the Remington College website.

The initial and ongoing prevention and awareness programs and campaign will also cover safe and positive options for bystanders to intervene to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking as well as information on risk reduction to recognize warning signs of abusive behavior and how to avoid potential attacks. Further, the prevention and awareness programs and campaign will cover possible sanctions and protective measures if it is determined a domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking incident has occurred involving a student or employee; procedures victims should follow in the event domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking occurs; procedures for institutional disciplinary action in cases of alleged domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking; information about how Remington College will protect the confidentiality of victims; and written notification of existing counseling, health, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance, visa and immigration assistance, student financial aid assistance, and other services for victims as well as victims options for, and available assistance in, changing academic, living, transportation, and working situations.

Further prevention programs can be arranged through the Campus President and/or any of the counseling services located in *Appendix 2*, the Resource, Counseling, and Assistance Contact Information page.

### **Applicable Definitions**

For the purposes of the Clery Act and the reporting of crime statistics, the following definitions apply:

**Domestic Violence:** (i) A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed – (A) By a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim; (B) By a person with whom the victim shares a child in common; (C) By a person who is cohabitating with, or has cohabitated with, the victim as a spouse or intimate partner; (D) By a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the

jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred; or (E) By any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

**Dating Violence:** Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim: (i) The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship; and (ii) for the purpose of this definition – (A) Dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse, and (B) Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.

**Sexual Assault:** Sexual assault means any sexual act directed against another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent. This includes (A) *Fondling* – the touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity; (B) *Incest* – sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law; and (C) *Statutory Rape* – sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Stalking: Stalking means (i) engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to – (A) Fear for the person's safety or safety of others; or (B) Suffer substantial emotional distress; and (ii) For the purpose of this definition – (A) Course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person's property, (B) Reasonable person means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim, and (C) Substantial emotional distress means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or other professional treatment or counseling.

Specific State applicable definitions are provided in *Appendix 3*.

# Procedure to Follow if an Alleged Incident of Sexual Harassment, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, or Stalking Occurs:

The College has implemented a Sexual Harassment Policy and Hearing Procedures to address allegations of Sexual Harassment, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking and will follow that Policy and Hearing Procedures if an allegation of Sexual Harassment, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and

Orders of Protection, No Contact Orders, and Restraining Orders: If a student obtains an order of protection, no contact order, restraining order, or other similar lawful order, the student shall notify and supply a copy of the order to the Campus President. When Remington College receives an order, it will utilize all reasonable measures it has at its disposal to help monitor and comply with the provisions of that order.

### Policy Regarding Notification Provided to Victims of Sexual Harassment, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, or Stalking

Any victim who reports an incident to a Reporting Official (as defined in Remington College's Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy) will be provided with a copy of Remington College's Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy and Hearing Procedures, which covers the victim's rights and options regarding the following:

- (1) Information stating the procedures victims should follow if a crime of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking has occurred, including written information about (a) the importance of preserving evidence that may assist in proving that the alleged criminal offense occurred or may be helpful in obtaining a protection order; (b) how and to whom the alleged offense should be reported; and (c) options about the involvement of law enforcement and campus authorities, including notification of the victim's option to notify proper law enforcement authorities, including on-campus and local police; and decline to notify such authorities.
- (2) Information about how the institution will protect the confidentiality of victims and other necessary parties.
- (3) Information about options for, available assistance in, and how to request changes to academic, living, transportation, and working situations or protective measures.
- (4) Information regarding the procedures for institutional disciplinary action in cases of alleged dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking where all parties involved are members of the Campus community.

### **Reported Crimes/Offenses**

The Campus-specific crime statistics, provided in Appendix 4, are provided in

compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998, are for your information. Remington College prepares this report to comply with the Clery Act. This report is prepared in cooperation with the local law enforcement offices, when possible, along with information from designated Campus officials.

Campus crime, arrest, and referral statistics include those reported to the designated Campus officials and local law enforcement. Each year, a notification that provides the web site address to access this report is distributed to all enrolled students. Faculty and staff receive similar written notification. Copies of the report may also be obtained at the office of the Campus President.

On-campus property includes any building or property owned or controlled by the Campus within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the Campus in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the Campus' educational purposes, including residence halls; and any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified above that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food vendor or other retail vendor).

Non-campus property includes any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the Campus; or any building or property owned or controlled by the Campus that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the Campus' educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the Campus.

Public property includes all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities that are within the Campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the Campus.

### **Appendix 3 Applicable State Crime Definitions for Clery Act Reporting**

### <u>TEXAS: (Dallas, Dallas Online, Fort Worth, North Houston Campuses, Houston Southeast Satellite Location)</u>

**Domestic Violence:** Family violence means: (1) an act by a member of a family or household against another member of the family or household that is intended to result in physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault or that is a threat that reasonably places the member in fear of imminent physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault, but does not include defensive measures to protect oneself; (2) abuse, as that term is defined by Sections 261.001(1)(C), (E), and (G), by a member of a family or household toward a child of the family or household; or (3) dating violence, as that term is defined by Section 71.0021 (TX Stat. § 71.004).

Dating Violence: Dating violence means an act, other than a defensive measure to protect oneself, by an actor that: (1) is committed against a victim: (A) with whom the actor has or has had a dating relationship; or (B) because of the victim's marriage to or dating relationship with an individual with whom the actor is or has been in a dating relationship or marriage; and (2) is intended to result in physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault or that is a threat that reasonably places the victim or applicant in fear of imminent physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault. For purposes of this title, "dating relationship" means a relationship between individuals who have or have had a continuing relationship of a romantic or intimate nature. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on consideration of: (1) the length of the relationship; (2) the nature of the relationship; and (3) the frequency and type of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship. (c) A casual acquaintanceship or ordinary fraternization in a business or social context does not constitute a "dating relationship" under Subsection (b). (TX Stat. § 71.0021).

Sexual Assault: A person commits an offense of sexual assault if the person: (1) intentionally or knowingly: (A) causes the penetration of the anus or sexual organ of another person by any means, without that person's consent; (B) causes the penetration of the mouth of another person by the sexual organ of the actor, without that person's consent; or (C) causes the sexual organ of another person, without that person's consent, to contact or penetrate the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; or (2) regardless of whether the person knows the age of the child at the time of the offense, the person intentionally or knowingly: (A) causes the penetration of the anus or sexual organ of a child by any means; (B) causes the penetration of the mouth of a child by the sexual organ of the actor; (C) causes the sexual organ of a child to contact or penetrate the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; (D) causes the anus of a child to contact the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; or (E) causes the mouth of a child to contact the anus or sexual organ of another person, including the actor (TX Stat. § 22.011).

**Stalking:** A person commits an offense of stalking if the person, on more than one occasion and pursuant to the same scheme or course of conduct that is directed specifically at another person, knowingly engages in conduct that: (1) constitutes an offense under Section 42.07, or that the actor knows or reasonably should know the other person will regard as threatening: (A) bodily injury or death for the other person; (B) bodily injury or death for a member of the other person's family or

household or for an individual with whom the other person has a dating relationship; or (C) that an offense will be committed against the other person's property; (2) causes the other person, a member of the other person's family or household, or an individual with whom the other person has a dating relationship to be placed in fear of bodily injury or death or in fear that an offense will be committed against the other person's property, or to feel harassed, annoyed, alarmed, abused, tormented, embarrassed, or offended; and (3) would cause a reasonable person to: (A) fear bodily injury or death for himself or herself; (B) fear bodily injury or death for a member of the person's family or household or for an individual with whom the person has a dating relationship; (C) fear that an offense will be committed against the person's property; or (D) feel harassed, annoyed, alarmed, abused, tormented, embarrassed, or offended (TX Stat. § 42.072).

Consent to Sexual Activity: A sexual assault is without the consent of the other person if: (1) the actor compels the other person to submit or participate by the use of physical force, violence, or coercion; (2) the actor compels the other person to submit or participate by threatening to use force or violence against the other person or to cause harm to the other person, and the other person believes that the actor has the present ability to execute the threat; (3) the other person has not consented and the actor knows the other person is unconscious or physically unable to resist; (4) the actor knows that as a result of mental disease or defect the other person is at the time of the sexual assault incapable either of appraising the nature of the act or of resisting it; (5) the other person has not consented and the actor knows the other person is unaware that the sexual assault is occurring; (6) the actor has intentionally impaired the other person's power to appraise or control the other person's conduct by administering any substance without the other person's knowledge; (7) the actor compels the other person to submit or participate by threatening to use force or violence against any person, and the other person believes that the actor has the ability to execute the threat; (8) the actor is a public servant who coerces the other person to submit or participate; (9) the actor is a mental health services provider or a health care services provider who causes the other person, who is a patient or former patient of the actor, to submit or participate by exploiting the other person's emotional dependency on the actor; (10) the actor is a clergyman who causes the other person to submit or participate by exploiting the other person's emotional dependency on the clergyman in the clergyman's professional character as spiritual adviser; (11) the actor is an employee of a facility where the other person is a resident, unless the employee and resident are formally or informally married to each other under Chapter 2, Family Code; (12) the actor is a health care services provider who, in the course of performing an assisted reproduction procedure on the other person, uses human reproductive material from a donor knowing that the other person has not expressly consented to the use of material from that donor; (13) the actor is a coach or tutor who causes the other person to submit or participate by using the actor's power or influence to exploit the other person's dependency on the actor; or (14) the actor is a caregiver hired to assist the other person with activities of daily life and causes the other person to submit or participate by exploiting the other person's dependency on the actor (TX Stat. § 22.011).
